Sunday afternoon entertainment resumes August 22! Library programs are free and open to the public; events will be held at the Congregational Church, 120 E. 5th St., Lusk, WY.



Kicking off the series is cinematic guitarist **Hiroya Tsukamoto** on **Sunday, August 22** at **1 p.m.** Tsukamoto is a one-of-a-kind composer, guitarist and singersongwriter from Kyoto, Japan. He

performs a mix of eclectic acoustic music, Japanese folk songs and storytelling.

On **Sunday, September 12** Broadway and film veteran **Duffy Hudson** brings his talent and fascination for *Edgar Allan Poe* to life in this unique one-man play. Using a combination of biographical information and dramatic interpretation of Poe's literature, Hudson provides a unique in-depth theatrical experience. Plan now to



attend this performance at **1:30 p.m.** at the Congregational Church.



Two troubadours are riding into Lusk for a special afternoon of contemporary western music and poetry on Sunday, September 26 at 1:30 p.m. Kerry Grombacher and Aspen Black will perform Songs & Stories of the American West, songs

that draw vivid portraits and tell fascinating stories set

in the Western landscape. Both are successful solo artists but have worked together as a duo since 2014, performing nationwide.

Sunday, October 17 The Fireants will be performing at 1:30 p.m. The Fireants play a variety of music of the Americas—Cajun Creole, Tejano and Norteño, Quebecois, Basque, Colombian Coastal Cumbia, Trinidadian Calypso, and Brazilian Forro.



Also included will be some swing from the U.S. and original tunes and some tunes that the band has rearranged from

traditional sources. The band is comprised of Cindy Baker, bass and vocals; Caitlin Belem, fiddle, guitar, alto sax, and vocals; Margo Brown, percussion, piano, and vocals; Courtney Caplan, guitar and vocals; and David Romtvedt, button accordions, trumpet, and vocals.

Rounding out the fall series will be a return visit by the **Ben Markley Trio** on **Sunday, November 7** at **1:30 p.m.** Jazz pianist Markley is also a composer

and arranger and performs regularly in the Denvermetropolitan area and along the Front Range. He will be joined by Alejandro Castano on the drums and Tom Amend on the organ.

BOOK DISCUSSION TO BEGIN IN SEPTEMBER


Every Family Has a Story is the theme for the fall book discussion series at the Niobrara County Library. The series features books with a variety of family dynamics and Barb Baker returns to facilitate the series. Late Migrations: A Natural History of Love and LATE MIGRATIONS Loss by Margaret Renkl will be discussed on Tuesday, September 7 at 6 p.m. Growing up in Alabama, Renkl was a devoted reader, an explorer of riverbeds and red-dirt roads, and a fiercely loved daughter. Here, in brief essays, she traces a tender and honest portrait of her complicated parents-her



exuberant, creative mother; her steady, supportive father-and of the bittersweet moments that accompany a child's transition to caregiver.

Monday, October 4 Inheritance: A Memoir of Genealogy,



Paternity, and Love by Dani Shapiro will be featured. In the spring of 2016, through a genealogy website to which she had whimsically submitted her DNA for analysis, Dani Shapiro received the stunning news that her father was not her biological father. She woke up one morning and her entire history-the life she had lived-crumbled beneath her. Inheritance is a book about secrets-secrets within

families, kept out of shame or self-protectiveness; secrets we keep from one another in the name of love. The discussion begins at 6 p.m.

The Beekeeper of Aleppo by Christy Lefteri will be discussed on Monday, November 1 at 6 p.m. This is an unforgettable love story of a mother blinded **BEEKEEPER** by loss and her husband who insists on their survival as they undertake the Syrian refugee trail to Europe. Nuri is a beekeeper; his wife, Afra, an artist. They live a simple life, rich in family and



friends, in the beautiful Syrian city of Aleppo-until the unthinkable happens. As Nuri and Afra travel through a broken world, they must confront not only the pain of their own unspeakable loss, but dangers that would overwhelm the bravest of souls. Above all, they must journey to find each other again.



Rounding out the series will be The Last Cowboys: a Pioneer Family in the New West by John Branch slated for discussion on Monday, December 6 at 6 p.m. For generations, the Wrights of southern Utah have raised cattle and world-champion saddle-bronc riders-many call them the most successful rodeo family in history. Now they find themselves fighting to save their land and livelihood as the West is

transformed by urbanization, battered by drought, and rearranged by public-land disputes. Could rodeo, of all things, be the answer?

DINNER & MOVIE SERIES BEGINS AUGUST 30

The Every Family Has a Story dinner and movie series is held at 6 p.m. and includes a light meal. Deane Tucker, Chadron State College professor will facilitate discussion. The first film, Frank Capra's 1938 Oscar winner, You Can't Take it With You will be shown on Monday, August 30. A man from a family of rich snobs becomes engaged to a woman from a good-natured but decidedly

eccentric family. When the two meet there is an inevitable clash of classes and lifestyles which cause great turmoil among the engaged. You Can't Take it With You is not rated and is 126 minutes.

Monday, September 27 will feature A River Runs Through It. The

film is a memoir of two very different brothers-one reserved, the other a hell-raiser, both angling for the attention of their preacher father, who uses fly-fishing as a metaphor to teach them about life. A River Runs Through It is rated PG, 127 minutes and begins at 6 p.m.





What's Eating Gilbert Grape is the story of a loner who cares for his dysfunctional family, including a challenged brother and their obese mother, who has not left the house in seven years. The film will be shown on Monday, October 25 at 6 p.m. and is rated PG-13 and is 118 minutes.

Tim Burton directs the fantasy drama Big Fish which will be shown on Monday, November 29 at 6 p.m. William Bloom is a young man who never really knew his now dying father, Edward-outside of the tall tales his dad told him about growing up. During Edward's last days, William and his wife, Josephine, hold a bedside



vigil next to the old man as he recollects elaborate memories of his youth. Big Fish is rated PG and 125 minutes.






