AROUND THE WORLD—IRELAND


When Candy Dooper and Tina Carstensen signed up for a

BOOK DISCUSSION AND DINNER & MOVIE SERIES ANNOUNCED

BOOK DISCUSSION

ROUTE 66 - AMERICAN HIGHWAYS is the theme for the fall book discussion series at the Niobrara County Library. Route 66 is one of the first national highways for motor vehicles in the United

States and one that became an icon in American popular culture. In November of 2026 the route celebrates its 100th anniversary. The discussion series includes books that celebrate not only Route 66 but American Highways. Tina Kitras-Seaman returns to facilitate the series. Stop by the library to register and pick up the first book in the series.

Tuesday, September 2 "Travels with Charley: In Search of America" by John Steinbeck will be featured at 6 p.m. The book is the story of an intimate journey across America, as told

by Steinbeck. With Charley, his French poodle, Steinbeck drives the interstates and the country roads, dines with truckers, encounters bears at Yellowstone and old friends in San Francisco. Along the way he reflects on the American character, racial hostility, the

American loneliness he finds almost everywhere and the unexpected kindness of strangers.

"Peace Like A River," is Leif Enger's debut novel. It is at once a heroic quest, a tragedy, and a love story. Raised on tales of cowboys and pirates, eleven-year-old asthmatic Reuben Land has little doubt that miracles happen all around us, and

that it's up to us to "make of it what we will." Their quiet Midwestern life is upended when Davy, the RIVER oldest son, kills two marauders who have come to harm the family. The morning of his sentencing, he

escapes from his cell, and the Lands set out in search of him. The family covers territory—far more extraordinary than even the Badlands—where they search for Davy from their Airstream trailer across the Midwest. "Peace Like A River" will be discussed on Monday, October 6 at 6 p.m.

The third book in the series is "Miles to Go: An African Family in Search of America Along Route 66" by Brennen Matthews and will be discussed on Monday, November 3 at 6 p.m. This is the story of a family from Africa in search of authentic America along the country's most famous highway, Route 66. Traveling the scenic byway from Illinois to California

they come across a fascinating assortment of historical landmarks, partake in quirky roadside attractions, and meet more than a few colorful characters. Brennen Matthews, along with his wife and their son, come face-to-face with real America. It is the record of an

America as it once was and one that, in some places, still

Rounding out the series will be "Our Time on Route 66" by Natalie Bright, Rory C. Keel, Joe Nichols, Cait Collins and Nancy Elke. This book is an anthology of five stories and

novellas that tell of good times and bad, love and OURTIME ON ROUTE 66 heartache, from the past to beyond tomorrow - all connected by one stop, the Tower Station and U-Drop Inn on Route 66. The book is slated for discussion on Monday, December 1 at 6 p.m. This overland route

was traveled by pioneers, migrant farmers and those looking for American dreams. These stories are all set on the historic route in Texas.

DINNER & MOVIE SERIES

ROUTE 66 – AMERICAN HIGHWAYS



No American road is as iconic as Route 66. Starting in Chicago, Illinois, and snaking cross-country to Santa Monica, California, Route 66 originally consisted of 2,448 miles of highway, rich with neon-

lit motels, quirky roadside attractions, and stretches of deserted landscape. With such a wealth of inspiration, it is no surprise that so many filmmakers have used Route 66 as a backdrop for their films.

Easy Rider is the first film in the series and will be shown on Monday, August 25 at 6 p.m. Filmed along Route 66 this 1969 film follows two "biker-hippies" (Peter Fonda and Dennis Hopper) as they head to New Orleans, crossing the west and southern United States. Along the way they encounter a host of interesting characters and strange situations. The film is rated R and 94 minutes.



Monday, September 29 The Grapes of Wrath will be featured. Based on John Steinbeck's novel of the same name, this 1940 film tells the story of an Oklahoman family heading to California on Route 66. Taking place during the Great Depression and the Dust Bowl period, the poverty-stricken Joad family leaves Oklahoma in search of a better life.

One of the pivotal scenes in the 1988 film *Rain Man* takes place at Route 66's Big 8 Motel in El Reno, Oklahoma. In the film, a self-

centered man learns he has an autistic older brother he never knew about until after their father dies and leaves the older brother the bulk of his multi-million dollar estate. The younger brother takes his institutionalized sibling on a road trip hoping to get some of the money for himself. *Rain Main* will be shown on Monday, October 27 at 6 p.m. and is rated R and 128 minutes.



Concluding the series is **Bagdad Café** on **Monday**, **November 24** at **6 p.m.** This 1987 film, also known as *Out of Rosenheim*, is a German



comedy-drama set in a remote truck-stop café and motel in the Mojave Desert in California. The story centers on two women who have recently separated from their husbands, and the friendship that grows between them. The setting of this film, Bagdad, California, is a former town on Route 66, which was abandoned and eventually razed after being

bypassed by Interstate 40 in 1973. The film is rated PG and 91 minutes.

Library programs are free and open to the public; a meal will also be available.
